The senior investiture was held last Tuesday in the hall. It was an excellent ceremony where our special guest was our P&C President and former school captain, Mr Greg Hammel. Mr Hammel gave a strong message to students to set goals and then work to achieve them and to be proud of their school which has serviced the community for over 50 years. BEENLEIGH STATE HIGH SCHOOL RESPONSIBLE ELECTRONICA POLICY SUMMARY

[The Use of Personal Technology Devices at School](#)

This policy *summary* reflects the importance the school places on students displaying courtesy, consideration and respect for others whenever they are using personal technology devices.

- The school does not accept responsibility or liability for damaged or stolen electronica such as mobile phones and other personal technology devices (e.g. iPods).
- Personal technologies must be turned off and out of sight during assemblies or classes.
- Personal technology should only be used in a classroom for learning under the explicit instruction and direction of a teacher.
- Personal technology devices may be used during morning tea and lunch breaks and before and after school.
- Teachers will remove electronica from students if they are not being used appropriately and they will be returned to students within a reasonable time frame.
- Recording of behaviours or incidents such as fighting, pranks or bullying on personal electronica is not permitted or legal. Recording of such incidences is an invasion of personal privacy and will result in disciplinary action.
- Devices containing evidence of criminal offences may be reported to the police. In the event of this occurring, police may take possession of such devices with students/parents advised to contact Queensland Police Service directly.
- The school takes no responsibility for, and has no jurisdiction over, personal social network content (e.g. Facebook, Twitter). Such matters should be referred to the Network Site itself (e.g. Facebook) or the Queensland Police Service.

QATSIF SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

Two of our year 10 students, Montel Butterworth and Toby Gregory, have been awarded a scholarship from a group called QATSIF.

The recipients will be able to use the funds to help pay for education costs over the next two years.

QATSIF (The Queensland Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Foundation), is an independent public trust established to provide young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Queenslanders with a funding source to assist students in their senior years of education. Its initial capital was created through the toil of previous generations of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Queenslanders, and has been invested by QATSIF's Trustee, the Public Trustee of Queensland. The annual interest from this investment provides an income stream

for scholarships and bursaries. In this way, the toil of previous generations is directly benefitting the generations that have followed, and with additional financial support from the wider community, QATSIF seeks to stand as a permanent and positive legacy for the future

The two recipients will be able to use the funds to help pay for education costs over the next two years.

This scholarship is not easily awarded. A student needs to perform to a high standard both academically and socially during their first three years of high school to become a recipient.
